#### **Course Information**

## **Catalog Description:**

PSYC-405 Special Topics in Psychology (3 credits) Examines specific topics in psychology through a seminar or workshop format. Prerequisite: Psychology 121 or permission of instructor.

Course Description: Emotions provide meaning and information about some of the most significant events in our lives. In this course, students will study current theories of emotion and the role of emotion in motivating our behavior and providing information about our varied contexts such as relationships and places. Students will have the opportunity to learn about emotions which warrant theoretical explanation. Throughout the class, students will have the opportunity to apply the theories and principles explored in the classroom in various, significant locations in the United Kingdom. We will focus on increasing psychological understanding while participating in curated experiences that allow students to generate, modify, explore, and understand emotional responses. For example, students can explore the feeling of awe while viewing exhibits in places such as the Museum of Natural History. They can put feelings of dissonance in context while viewing controversial artifacts in spaces such as The British Museum, and explore concepts of fear, in "haunted" locations. Students completing this course will be better equipped to explain the affectively motivated behaviors of self and others.

#### **Credit Hour Policy Statement:**

This class meets the federal credit hour policy through a combination of lecture + laboratory (or lecture + practicum) for a total of 45-75 hours of supervised learning activities for each credit.

There will be occasions when you are asked to gather into small groups during class to discuss material, etc. There will also be four days of experiential activities and guided activities.
