#### **Course Information**

## **Catalog Description:**

Acquaints students with the process of creating theatre and enhances their ability to enjoy and appreciate live theatrical performances.

Requires observations of evening performances in addition to attendance of lectures. (UE Outcome 5)

At Harlaxton, students will attend theatrical performances in London and surrounding cities, to gain a first had experience of theatre as a form of artistic expression. Class sessions will further explore these plays, their connection to contemporary culture, as well as the "how and why" of their creation.

### **Course Learning Outcomes:**

To gain a broad understanding of the process of theatre making, and an appreciation of the cultural and aesthetic value of plays and other forms of live theatrical performance.

To explore a variety of performance styles, venues, and the relationship between audience and performer.

To enhance the student's ability to understand, enjoy and appreciate and critique contemporary theatrical events.

## **Program Learning Outcomes:**

Develops and understanding an appreciation for Human Aesthetic Creation and Artistic Creativity.

#### **Required Materials:**

Theatre As Human Action: An Introduction to Theatre Arts 4<sup>th</sup> Edition By Thomas S. Hischak and Mark A. Robinson

Students will attend evening performances, tours and exhibits in London and surrounding communities. The course fee supports ticket and transportation costs.

#### **Methods of Instructions:**

Methods of instruction will include:

- In person lecture
- In class discussion
- Research projects and presentations
- Group projects
- Field trips to London and UK theatres and museums to see live theatre and performance related exhibits

## Withdrawal and Attendance policies:

Harlaxton College expects regular class attendance by all students. Students are considered sufficiently mature to appreciate the necessity of regular and punctual attendance, to accept this personal responsibility and to accept the consequences of failure to attend. When absences occur due to emergency or medical reasons, students are expected to notify their instructors of the absence prior to class or to seek the assistance of the College nurse or a member of the Student Support Team for help in notifying instructors.

The Principal has the authority to grant excused absences for medical, psychological, or personal reasons.

This class is dependent on attending live theatrical events and participation in class discussion and presentations. Therefore, unexcused absences will result in a lowered final grade.

An unexcused absence from a scheduled field trip will result in your final grade being lowered 10% and will impact your ability to do related class work.

Final grade will be docked 5% for each unexcused absence of a class meeting time.

If you must miss a field trip for a university excused absence or illness please let me know as soon as possible so that we can come up with an alternative assignment.

Students are responsible for the academic consequences of their failure to attend class. If any assessment (e.g. inclass presentation) is missed there is no expectation or requirement that a faculty member will accept the work after it is due, provide an extension to a deadline, or offer an alternative assignment for a student with an unexcused absence.

#### **Grading Criteria:**

Since there are no textbooks or exams, students are expected to attend all lectures, performances, and class trips. It is also expected that students be actively engaged in class discussion and presentations. Students will respond individually to performances through written reflection and in-class presentations. Attendance to all performances are required.

- Individual presentation(s) relating to the required performances (15%)
- One group presentation on a topic relating to the creation of a theatrical event (15%)
- Short written reflections for each play and exhibit attended (35%)
- Responses to assigned readings (20%)
- Class participation, attitude, participation, etc. (10%)
- Written course reflection at time of final (5%)
